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Joyce Travelbee assumes that nursing is fulfilled by means of human-to-human relationship. She defined nursing as "an interpersonal process whereby the professional nurse practitioner assists an individual, family or community to prevent or cope with experience or illness and suffering, and if necessary, to find meaning in these experiences".

The theory was presented in her book, Interpersonal Aspects of Nursing, which was published in 1961. The assumptions of the model are based on Soren Kierkegaard's philosophy of existentialism and Viktor Frankl's logotherapy. Existentialism places the accountability for people's choices in life on the people who make those choices.

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Joyce Travelbee (1926-1973) was an American nurse who in 1960 dealt with the interpersonal aspects of nursing. She had based on psychiatric nursing. Travelbee's theory anticipated a showdown with the positivist view of human nature. She believed that the patients were largely become objects of care and so was not seen as human beings.
